Due to COVID-19, Tracy Unified School District, like many districts across the nation and the globe, began the 2020-2021 school year in a distance learning instructional model. On June 7, 2020, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) placed San Joaquin County on its monitoring list. On July 17, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom announced that if a county has been on the monitoring list within the prior 14 days, a school must conduct distance learning only, until the county has been off the monitoring list for at least 14 days. In counties on the monitoring list, CDPH guidance allows a district superintendent, private school principal/head of school, or executive director of a charter school (hereinafter superintendent) to apply for a waiver from the local health officer to open an elementary school for in-person instruction. This waiver is applicable only for grades TK-6, even if the grade configuration at the school includes additional grades.

Waiver requests will not be granted before San Joaquin's countywide case rate is under 200 per 100,000 for 7 consecutive days. The county is recommending a phased approach in school districts with multiple TK-6 schools, to open schools in staggered intervals. When applying for the waiver, the superintendent must submit to the local health officer evidence of (1) consultation with labor and parent organizations and (2) publication of the elementary school reopening plans on the website of the local educational agency (or equivalent). The local health officer then reviews the application and reopening plan (along with local community epidemiological data), makes a determination whether to grant or deny the waiver, and consults with CDPH regarding that determination. Elementary schools in

counties on the monitoring list within the prior 14 days may not open for in-person instruction until they have received approval of a submitted waiver from the local health officer. On August 28, 2020 San Joaquin Public Health released the Elementary Schools Reopening Application Waiver for district to apply. Now that the number of new cases per 100K has fallen under 14 to 12.6, San Joaquin County Public Health department is currently accepting and approving waivers for the re-opening of schools.

TUSD has now began the process of applying for the reopening schools application waiver and will open schools when it is safe to do so. The TUSD plan includes bringing back TK-5th grade students to align with the TUSD configuration of elementary schools. Please see the TUSD phases of reopening schools:

Phase 1

- 2020-2021 School Year begins with Distance Learning
- In the month of July 2020, Governor Newsom announced that all schools in California were to begin school with a Distance Learning Model
- TUSD began school August 11, 2020 with a Distance Learning Model

Phase 2

- Small Group Cohorts
- On August 25, 2020 California Department of Public Health(CDPH) issued the Cohorting Guidance regarding permissible small-group in-person services. In the K-12
 Schools setting, cohorts are stable groups of students with no more than 16 individuals, who are meeting for targeted supports and intervention services, under the
 direction of the LEA, while the school is closed to in person instruction and in addition to distance learning. Regardless of the name (e.g., "learning hubs" or "pods"),
 all of the provisions in the Cohorting Guidance must be followed for such cohorts to meet, whether they are operated by LEAs, non-profits, or other providers.
- TUSD has developed a plan to bring back small cohort groups for SDC students in preschool-5th grade, tentatively scheduled to begin October 5, 2020.

Phase 3

- Elementary Schools Reopening
- On August 28, 2020 San Joaquin Public Health released the Elementary Schools Reopening Application Waiver for district to apply. Now that the number of new cases per 100K has fallen under 14 to 12.6, San Joaquin County Public Health department is currently accepting and approving waivers for the re-opening of schools.
- TUSD began the process to apply for reopening elementary schools for grades TK-5 with a proposed Hybrid Model of bringing student cohort groups back to school 2 days a week, 8:15am-11:30am. If TUSD reopening Elemenatary Schools Application is appproved by the school board and County Health department, TUSD may tentatively open the month of November.

Phase 4

- All TUSD Schools Reopen
- When San Joaquin County moves from "purple" to "red" and all grades are allowed to return at 100% physical attendance.
- TUSD will communicate plans to bring all students back to school at 100% physical attendance at 5 days a week.

Cohorting: How students will be kept in small, stable, groups with fixed membership that stay together for all activities (*e.g.*, instruction, lunch, recess) and minimize/avoid contact with other groups or individuals who are not part of the cohort.

TUSD will implement a Hybrid Model to ensure small cohorts of students:

- a) Group A (student last name beginning with A-L) cohort shall attend in person learning on Mondays and Thursday of each week. A calendar will be created for weeks that do not have five student days so that half of the week's days will be assigned for cohort A to attend in person learning.
- b) Group B (student last name beginning with M-Z) cohort shall attend in person learning on Tuesday and Friday of each week. A calendar will be created for weeks that do not have five student days so that half of the week's days will be assigned for Group B to attend in person learning.
- c) One day per week (Wednesdays) will be assigned for both Group A and Group B cohorts to receive distance learning so that Unit members may perform all professional duties for both the in-person and distance learning. Teachers will have the option to work from home on this day, including attendance at professional development and staff meeting activities.
 - a. All shared playground structures and equipment will be suspended until further notice.
 - b. All shared classroom supplies will be limited and strongly discouraged.

Face Coverings and Other Essential Protective Gear: How CDPH's face covering requirements will be satisfied and enforced.

COVID-19 Face Covering Quick Guide for TUSD Students

Face coverings may help reduce the spread of potentially infectious droplets within the community when combined with physical distancing and hand washing.

Per California Department of Public Health (CDPH) guidance dated August 25th, 2020: Physical distancing, in combination with the use of face coverings, decrease the risk of COVID 19 from respiratory droplets. Physical distancing between adults must be maintained as much as possible, and adults and students must use face coverings at all

times, pursuant to the CDPH Schools Guidance. See the CDPH Guidance on Schools and School Based Programs (PDF) and Child Care (PDF) for additional considerations regarding, face mask, meals, cleaning, drop off/pick up, and health screenings.

Face Coverings *must* be used in accordance with CDPH guidelines *unless* a person is exempt as explained below. Face Coverings are particularly important in places such as indoor environments, on school buses, and areas where physical distancing alone is not sufficient to help prevent disease transmission.

How to Use:

The San Joaquin County Department of Public Health encourages the public to wear a face covering over your nose and mouth when you must be in public for essential activities (e.g., shopping at the grocery store). Face Coverings are for those who can maintain a minimum of 6 feet distance with other people in their work environment and require little to no interaction with the general public. Wearing a face covering does not eliminate the need to physically distance yourself from others and to wash your hands frequently.

Cloth Face Covering Care:

Wash cloth face covering frequently, ideally after each use, or at least daily - Launder with detergent and hot water - Dry on hot cycle - Wash your hands when putting on and removing your face covering and avoid touching your face.

Some examples of Face Coverings:

Bandana, Homemade sewn cloth, Scarf, Tightly woven fabric, cloth mask, disposable mask, etc.

Per California Department of Education, at a minimum face coverings should be worn:

- While waiting to enter the school campus.
- While on school grounds (except when eating or drinking).
- While leaving school
- While on a school bus

The following individuals are exempt from wearing a face covering per CDPH Guidance dated June 18, 2020:

- •Persons younger than two years old. These very young children must not wear a face covering because of the risk of suffocation.
- •Persons with a medical condition, mental health condition, or disability that prevents wearing a face covering. This includes persons with a medical condition for whom wearing a face covering could obstruct breathing or who are unconscious, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to remove a face covering without assistance.
- •Persons who are hearing impaired, or communicating with a person who is hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication.

- •Persons for whom wearing a face covering would create a risk to the person related to their work, as determined by local, state, or federal regulators or workplace safety guidelines.
- •Persons who are obtaining a service involving the nose or face for which temporary removal of the face covering is necessary to perform the service.
- •Persons who are seated at a restaurant or other establishment that offers food or beverage service, while they are eating or drinking, provided that they are able to maintain a distance of at least six feet away from persons who are not members of the same household or residence.
- •Persons who are engaged in outdoor work or recreation such as swimming, walking, hiking,

bicycling, or running, when alone or with household members, and when they are able to maintain a distance of at least six feet from others.

Note: Persons exempted from wearing a face covering due to a medical condition who are employed in a job involving regular contact with others should wear a non-restrictive alternative, such as a face shield with a drape on the bottom edge, as long as their condition permits it.

2 years old-2 nd grade	Strongly Encouraged**
3 rd grade - High School	Yes, unless exempt by MD

^{**}Face coverings are strongly encouraged for young children between two years old and second grade, if they can be worn properly. A face shield is an acceptable alternative for children in this cohort who cannot wear them properly.

Entrance, Egress, and Movement Within the School: How movement of students, staff, and parents will be managed to avoid close contact and/or mixing of cohorts.

 All TUSD Elementary Schools have developed Site Operational Plans to promote safe movement on campus with hybrid model cohorts.

Health Screenings for Students and Staff: How students and staff will be screened for symptoms of COVID-19 and how ill students or staff will be separated from others and sent home immediately.

All sites will administer temperature checks to students upon entering their first
period class/homeroom. Staff members will continue to follow the self-check
symptom guidance prior to coming to work provided by TUSD Human Resources
Department aligned to the San Joaquin County Health Department guidance.
Students and staff who are displaying COVID-19 symptoms will follow the health
processes and protocols provided by San Joaquin County Health Department.

Healthy Hygiene Practices: The availability of handwashing stations and hand sanitizer, and how their use will be promoted and incorporated into routines.

• All TUSD classrooms and facilities will have hand sanitizer available and encouraged to use regularly.

Identification and Tracing of Contacts: Actions that staff will take when there is a confirmed case. Confirm that the school(s) have designated staff persons to support contact tracing, such as creation and submission of lists of exposed students and staff to the local health department and notification of exposed persons. Each school must designate a person for the local health department to contact about COVID-19.

Physical Distancing: How space and routines will be arranged to allow for physical distancing of students and staff.

A Hybrid Learning Model will be implemented in the event of San Joaquin County Health Department providing guidance of required social distancing

- Social Distancing Model with 2 full-day classroom attendance & three-day distance learning program
- All students and staff are required to wear masks, with the exception of those who
 have a medical/health condition that prohibit it, when attending the 2 full days of
 instruction at school.
- Integrated social emotional learning
- TUSD's standards-based, adopted curriculum focused on all Critical & Essential Priority Standards
- Student learning aligned to rigor, relevance, and relationships Student engagement through instructional best practices with blended learning embedded

All TUSD school sites will implement Operational COVID-19 Safety Measure Plans

- a. Established arrival and departure processes & protocols
- b. Classroom Space will recommend to space desks further apart to promote physical distancing where practicable, with one directional seating
- c. Remove all excess furniture to allow for maximum distancing within a classroom.

 Non-Classroom Space will have established processes & protocols for one directional foot trafficking

Staff Training and Family Education: How staff will be trained, and families will be educated on the application and enforcement of the plan.

Testing of Students and Staff: How school officials will ensure that students and staff who have symptoms of COVID-19 or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19 will be rapidly tested and what instructions they will be given while waiting for test results. Describe how staff will be tested periodically to detect asymptomatic infections.

 TUSD will follow guidance currently being developed by San Joaquin County Health Department.

Triggers for Switching to Distance Learning: The criteria the superintendent will use to determine when to physically close the school and prohibit in-person instruction.

• TUSD will follow guidance provide by San Joaquin County Health Department.

Communication Plans: How the superintendent will communicate with

students, staff, and parents about cases and exposures at the school, consistent with privacy requirements such as FERPA and HIPAA.

We look forward to continuing to provide ongoing communication and updates throughout the year as we navigate through the year of 2020-2021.
